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globalization has taken the world by storm and has facilitated the unprecedented migrations of the peoples of this world whether we like it or not we will meet foreigners in our communities schools universities buses and other public places but when people migrate they take their religions with them if people of different religious traditions are to live side by side amicably interfaith dialogue becomes imperative but for people to be able to speak about their own religions with enlightenment and listen to other people s religious beliefs with respect they must have some basic knowledge of how faiths and believers operate because for some people religion is inseparably intertwined with their economics politics and everyday lives this book clearly and concisely introduces religious studies to the reader it makes a strong case for the quest and study of world religions and explores the challenges controversies and methodological issues in the

study of religions it also explores other pertinent religious issues such as beliefs rituals myths sacredness morality the problem of evil and interreligious dialogue although written from a classroom perspective this book can be useful to any reader who would like to acquire knowledge of religious issues

the sacred heart is as simeon prophesied of jesus himself signum cui contradicetur like the title of his blessed mother who is in very truth mother of god it has drawn to itself all the assaults of heresy for it is a divine test of faith in the mystery of the word made flesh ut revelentur ex multis cordibus cogitationes those who have trusted with a yearning hope that the faith of englishmen in the incarnation at least was firm and clear were saddened and silenced when the pilgrimage to paray le monial elicited from some of the highest sources of the established religion a profession of simple nestorianism it was then that the first fifty pages in this book were published having been out of print for some time they are now reprinted as the doctrinal foundation of all that follows the devotion of the sacred heart has two aspects the one as the centre of all dogma the other as the source of the deepest devotion in this latter aspect it reveals to us the personal love of our divine redeemer towards each and every one for whom he died it is a manifestation of his pity tenderness compassion and mercy to sinners and to penitents nevertheless its chief characteristic and its dominant note is his disappointment at the returns we make to him for his love and above all his divine displeasure at the faults and sins of those who are specially consecrated at his service he seems to be sadly upbraiding us with the three doubting questions which he put to peter lovest thou me and to be looking upon us as he turned and looked on him when he had thrice denied his master into this part of the devotion of the sacred heart i have not ventured it has already been treated so profusely by others and by many of whom i have only to learn it is in itself so deep and intimately related to the personal life and mind of each that i have always felt it better to use but few suggestive words rather than to draw out devotional acts which to the writer are no doubt spontaneous natural and real but to the reader may be a burden like saul s armour to david in the following pages therefore i have intentionally confined myself to the dogmatic side of the devotion and for the following reasons i believe firmly that when divine truth is fully and duly apprehended it generates devotion that one cause of shallowness in the spiritual life is a superficial apprehension of the dogma of the incarnation and that one divine purpose in the institution and diffusion of the devotion of the sacred heart in these last times is to reawaken in the minds of men the consciousness of their personal relation to a divine master he has foretold the dimness and coldness of these latter days the son of man when he cometh shall he find think you faith on the earth s luke xviii 8 because iniquity hath abounded the charity of many shall grow cold s matt xxiv 12 in that day the disciples of the sacred heart at least will know whom they have believed

over 600 years before the revelations of divine mercy to st faustina and over 300 years before the revelations of the sacred heart to st margaret mary alacoque there were the revelations of the sacred heart to st mechtild 1241 1298 a benedictine nun and friend of st gertrude the great lovers of the devotion to the sacred heart of jesus will find many similarities between these and the other apparition where god has shared the mystery of the sacred heart with mankind though there is no evidence that she was familiar with st mechtild s writings most importantly our lord speaks on

topime of great importance in the practice of the devout life the divine office frequent confession and communion and so forth these divine revelations also greatly influenced the poet dante when he wrote his divine comedy

disenchantment is a key term in the self understanding of modernity but what exactly do we mean when we use this concept what was its original meaning when max weber introduced it and can the conventional meaning or max weber s view really be defended given the present state of knowledge about the history of religion this book is an attempt to divest this concept of its enduring enchantment the first chapters of the book deal with the three empirical disciplines history psychology and sociology of religion to develop an understanding of religion that then lays the groundwork for what is presented in chapter 4 namely the most thorough study of weber s views on disenchantment that has ever been undertaken it turns out that weber s use was highly ambiguous and that his grand narrative leading from the prophets of ancient judaism to the crisis of meaning on the eve of the first world war collapses when we recognize this ambiguity this makes it possible to construct an alternative that takes into account the dynamics of ever new sacralizations their normative evaluation in the light of the values of a universalist morality and the dangers of the misuse of religion in connection with the formation of power this book constitutes a challenge for believers and non believers alike

cheyennes at dark water creek tells the tragic story of the southern bands of cheyennes from the period following the treaty of medicine lodge through the battles and skirmishes known as the red river war the battle of sappa creek the last encounter of that conflict was a fight between a band of cheyennes and a company of the sixth cavalry that took place in kansas in april 1875 more cheyennes were killed in that single engagement than in all the previous fighting of the war combined and later there were controversial charges of massacre and worse william y chalfant has used all known contemporaneous sources to recount the tragedy that occurred at the place known to the cheyennes as dark water creek in cheyenne memories its name remains second only to sand creek in the terrible images and the sorrow it evokes chalfant tells the story in a sweeping style that recreates cheyenne life on the southern plains beyond examining firsthand and secondary accounts in detail the author personally retraced the route of the army detachment from fort wallace kansas to the battle site at sappa creek and the route of the cheyennes from punished women s fork to the sappa his recounting of the lives of the indian and military participants both leading up to and following the battle is sure to appeal both to scholars of the indian wars and to the general reader

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
